ACTION: By acclamation, the City Council extended the meeting past 11 p.m.

The City Council received clarification on number of replacement parking spaces, zoning actions, civic center considerations, Builder's Remedy implications, California Department of Housing & Community Development (HCD) recourse for failed Housing Element program implementation, home ownership below market rate (BMR) units, next steps and timeline of a RFQ, potential to secure multiple developers for one, two or all three of Parking Plazas 1 through 3, building height and access control, ability to revert land to parking and surplus land declaration.

The City Council discussed affordable units by District, parking needs for new residents, Downtown enhancements, impacts to the Downtown community, public comment requests and edits to the RFQ, public outreach and community engagement and including phasing options in the RFQ.

The City Council directed staff to include a request for project phasing approaches that would allow for sufficient public parking in the RFQ, authorized staff to release the RFQ, and deferred action on the Surplus Land Act declaration.

ACTION: Motion and second (Nash/ Schmidt), to authorize staff to release the RFQ as outlined in the staff report including a description of phasing that would ensure the availability of sufficient parking, passed unanimously.

NATIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT APPRECIATION DAY

WHEREAS, National Law Enforcement Appreciation Day was founded by multiple organizations in 2015 to recognize officers across the country for the daily sacrifices they make for their communities; and

WHEREAS, the leading organization, Concerns of Police Survivors (C.O.P.S) provides a national support network for families and co-workers who have lost a loved one in the line of duty and supports positive recognition of officers doing good work every day; and

WHEREAS, Law Enforcement Officers of every rank and file have chosen a profession that puts their life on the line in order to maintain public safety for the good of all; and

WHEREAS, in addition to intense training and personal risk, Law Enforcement Officers often give up holidays and milestones with their families and loved ones to do their jobs; and

WHEREAS, Law Enforcement Officers have answered a call to public service that is uniquely demanding and often unappreciated and face many challenges, including responding to emergencies, investigating crimes and building trust with the community; and

WHEREAS, there are over 900,000 officers in the United States, and in 2024, over 128 officers died in the line of duty, over 79,000 were assaulted in the line of duty, and on average 184 officers commit suicide each year; and

WHEREAS, we appreciate the extraordinary efforts and sacrifices made by officers and their family members in order to protect our schools, workplaces, roadways, and homes; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED, I, Drew Combs, Mayor of the City of Menlo Park, on behalf of the City Council and City, hereby recognize January 9, 2025 as Law Enforcement Appreciation Day and commend all Law Enforcement Officers for their commitment to protecting the public and upholding the law.

NATIONAL HUMAN TRAFFICKING PREVENTION MONTH

WHEREAS, the United States Senate designated January 11 as National Human Trafficking Awareness Day in 2007 and, beginning in 2010, by Presidential Proclamation, each January has been designated National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking, sex trafficking, commercial sexual exploitation and labor exploitation are human rights violations, illegal under federal and California law, and promote the breakdown of families and communities, fuel organized crime, deprive countries of human capital, undermine public health and impose large economic costs; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking is a global, national, and regional problem. It is happening throughout the United States, and it happens in San Mateo County. It is a lucrative crime and is one of the fastest growing criminal industries in the world; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has identified California and the San Francisco Bay Area as an area of high prevalence for human trafficking. In 2021, approximately 300 individuals were identified within San Mateo County in 2020 who had been victimized by human trafficking, including minors and adults; and

WHEREAS, although forced labor, involuntary domestic servitude and commercial sexual exploitation of adults and youth are illegal, victims often do not recognize their victimization, do not know that help is available or where to seek assistance. Additionally, community members may not know how to identify the red flags of trafficking or how to report suspicious circumstances; and

WHEREAS, everyone can help in the fight against human trafficking. By raising your own awareness of this crime, and the awareness of others, you can help victims and our community by learning the signs of human trafficking and how to respond when you see suspicious circumstances; and



JOINT MEETING WITH CHAMBER SAN MATEO COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS



- Dec. 11 virtual business community meeting participation
 - Over 120 participants
 - 7 interactive polling questions
 - 56% of respondents identified primarily as Menlo Park residents, 15% as downtown property owners, 14% as downtown business owners
- Key project priorities selected by participants
 - Minimizing disruption, maintaining adequate parking (42%)
 - Mixed-use development (30%)
 - New customer base through housing (15%)
- Preferred public parking configuration
 - Combined surface/structured parking (30%)
 - Multiple smaller parking structures (23%)
 - No preference as long as adequate number of spaces provided (21%)



JOINT MEETING WITH CHAMBER SAN MATEO COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS



- Other key responses from participants
 - Top descriptions of downtown today: "dead" (6 responses), "sleepy" and "underutilized" (4 responses each), "disappointing" (3 responses)
 - Common themes regarding needs to make downtown thrive: parking and access (10 responses), retail and restaurant mix (9 responses), business support and development (7 responses)
 - Preferences for updates on project: Email notifications (69%), virtual meetings (14%), project webpage updates (10%)
 - Other project aspects: parking and access (8 responses), consideration of alternative locations (6 responses), project opposition (5 responses)

 Parking assessment district bonds paid off in 1980s





FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- Key topic areas of interest (continued)
 - Civic Center alternate development location
 Civic Center considered during Housing Element process but not included to maintain community parks, recreation, and gathering spaces
 - Construction impacts

To be managed in coordination with selected developer; overview of approach requested as part of RFQ





SURPLUS LAND ACT

- State law regulating local agencies prior to sale or lease of public land
- Requires local agencies to prioritize affordable housing before disposition for other purposes
- Determination is at City Council's discretion
- Declaration of "exempt surplus land"
 - Covers land that could be used to provide affordable housing
 - Allows more flexibility in developer selection process
- Resolution can be adopted before or after RFQ process
- Proposed resolution does not obligate City to enter into agreement to develop a site

 - Emphasis on potential for mixed-use and/or mixed-income projects





RECOMMENDATION AND OPTIONS

- Staff recommends adoption of resolution declaring Parking Plazas
 1, 2 and 3 as exempt surplus land, and authorization to release
 RFQ
 - Provide revisions to RFQ
- Other options
 - 1. Authorize RFQ release only, defer surplus land declaration resolution
 - 2. Provide alternate direction to staff





NEXT STEPS

- If authorized, staff would:
 - Release RFQ in January 2025
 - Submit SLA exemption declaration to HCD
 - Return to City Council in Spring 2025
 - Summary of RFQ submissions
 - Recommendations for next steps
- Community outreach will continue throughout process
