- A request for assistance with outreach for the Zero Emission Landscape Equipment discount program
- Electrification building permit process improvements
- City Council receiving funding from Senator Josh Becker for existing building electrification

Management Analyst II Paz provided an update on climate action plan (CAP) No. 5 efforts, highlighting EV charging, water heater electrification for City facilities, the CAP No. 5 roadmap status, and Zoning Ordinance updates to facilitate electrification.
