

State-mandated plan to meet housing needs.

-Policies and programs for housing for current and future residents



Allocates affordable and market-rate housing needs to be met on 8-year cycle.



Designed to fit local needs as well as regional context.













PURPOSE

The Safety Element shall provide for the "protection of the community from any unreasonable risks associated with the effects of...seismic hazards; flooding; and wildland and urban fires." (Government Code 65302 (g))

Senate Bill 379


- Review and update Safety Element at the same time as the Housing Element Update

- Expand the City and community's ability to prepare for and respond to climate events









Health Equity

No person is disadvantaged in attaining their full health potential because of systemic or structural issues such as social or economic position, education, employment, housing, income, or selfdetermination.

Environmental Justice

"the fair treatment of people of all races, cultures, and incomes with respect to the development, adoption, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies." State of CA Assembly Bill No.1628

A difference in health between different populations, neighborhoods, or communities

CA State Bill 1000 (2016)

Reduce the <u>unique or compounded health</u> <u>risks</u> in <u>Equity Priority Communities</u> through <u>environmental justice planning</u>.

Three Phases:

- **Phase 1.** Identifying Equity Priority Communities
- **Phase 2.** Understanding Comprehensive Health Risks
- **Phase 3.** Planning for Environmental Justice

Phase 1: Identify Equity Priority Communities

Poor Environmental Conditions

High levels of environmental hazards that can lead to negative public health effects, exposure, or environmental degradation.

Socially or economically burdened groups of people


Concentrations of people that are of low income, high unemployment, low levels of homeownership, high rent burden, sensitive populations, or low levels of educational attainment.

SB1000 Definition

- Affected by environmental pollution and other (have combined CalEnviroScreen score of >75%, or
- Have household incomes <80% of the statewide median income, or
- At or below the threshold designated as low income by HCD

Phase 1: Identify Equity Priority Communities



Map the planning area census tracts that have a combined score of 75% or higher in CalEnviroScreen.


Map the planning area census tracts at or below statewide median income.

Map the area at or below the Department of Housing and Community Development's state income limits. Incorporate communityspecific data and examine for additional pollution burden.

Environmental Justice Screen

In Menlo Park:

- **No** census tracts with CalEnviroScreen score ≥75%
- **Three** tracts at or below the threshold designated as low income by HCD.
- **One** tract with household incomes incomes <80% of the statewide median income



Reuse Sites (between 0.5-10 acres)

Area with Household Incomes < Statewide Median Income and at/below HCD Low Income Threshold






