2) School Updates and Priorities

- Laurel School had their 3rd grade bike rodeo and 4th grade bike education in the classroom. Group bike ride to Hillview in August.
- Encinal Elementary is working on promoting carpooling and grouping families to walk or bike. Also have bike rodeos planned.

Citywide messaging to encourage alternative transportation to the family vehicle.

Discussion on school bus – how to encourage more families to take the bus instead of the car? Costs? Messaging? Is there enough school bus? There are wait lists for Menlo Park City School District schools.

Allows more flexibility for families to take the schools bus – for example need to sign up at the beginning of the school year, price if it just for a few days per month.

3) E-Bikes and Youth, Discussion

Jeff Scanlan, the owner of Pedego Menlo Park presents on e-bikes and youth. See presentation. *Discussion:*

- Students riding too fast, not respecting the rules of the road are a challenge downtown Menlo Park, on Santa Cruz Avenue and on other streets throughout the city.
- Concerns about the potential higher speed and the heavier weight of the e-bikes. In case
 of a bike-vehicle collision or bike-pedestrian collision, injuries might be more severe for the
 bicyclist and pedestrian.
- Unless they are cargo bikes, e-bikes are not made to carry more than one person.
- Messaging and tips:
 - Riding an e-bike is an earned privilege not a right. It comes with responsibilities that means operating it safely.
 - Good maintenance of the e-bike to ensure its good and safe condition on the road.
 E-bike should be checked by a professional after a fall or crash.
 - o Parents should show good example, e.g., wearing a helmet when riding a bike.
 - Riding on sidewalk: if children ride on the sidewalk regularly and is not comfortable to ride in the street, might not be ready for an e-bike. Families should know where it is prohibited in Menlo Park (downtown streets)
 - E-bike are relatively new to drivers too drivers might not be used to the speed of e-bike.
- Education starts at home. It is the parents' responsibility to educate their child and make sure they are mature enough for e-bike, understand rules of the road, and so on.
- Role of the school was discussed. Education, enforcement, communication with parents.
 Can schools give detentions or extra homework for unsafe biking behavior. School could call the parents if officers give students' names. Bike license plates for middle and high school students?
- Role of enforcement was discussed. Balance between enforcement, engineering and
 education. How to be a community that encourage safe biking? What are good practices
 from other cities? Traffic unit has limited staff. Traffic unit is evaluating if they should give
 warning citations but does not have capacity to be on Santa Cruz Avenue every day.
 Enforcement limited to change behaviors education opportunity.
 - Community service related to transportation
 - Consequences at the school
 - How to frame the conversation, less enforcement/punishment and more encouragement to keep the car at home to travel to school?
- Bike infrastructure in Menlo Park currently adequate for e-bikes?
